## § 1910.1200 Hazard communication,

(a) Purpose. (1) The purpose of this section is to ensure that the hazards of all chemicals produced or imported are classified, and that information concerning the classified hazards is transmitted to employers and employees. The requirements of this section are intended to be consistent with the provisions of the United Nations Globally Harmonized System of Classification and Labelling of Chemicals (GHS), Revision 3. The transmittal of information is to be accomplished by means of comprehensive hazard communication programs, which are to include container labeling and other forms of warning, safety data shoets and employed training.

ployee training.

(2) This occupational safety and health standard is intended to addrass comprehensively the issue of classifying the potential hazards of clienticals, and communicating information concerning hexards and appropriate protective measures to employess, and to preempt any legislative or regulatory enactments of a state, pertaining to this subject. Classifying the potential hazards of chamicals and communicating information concerning hazards and appropriate protective measures to employees, may include, for example, but is not limited to, provisions for developing and maintaining a written hazard communication program for the workplace, including lists of hexardous chemicals present; labeling of containers of

chemicals in the workplace, as well as of containers of chemicals being shipped to other workplaces; preparation and distribution of safety data sheets to employees and downstream employers; and development and implementation of employee training programs regarding hazards of chemicals and protective measures. Under section 16 of the Act, no state or political subdivision of a state may adopt or enforce any requirement relating to the issue addressed by this Federal standard, except pursuant to a Federally-approved state plan.

(b) Scope and application. (1) This section requires chemical manufacturers or importers to classify the hazards of chemicals which they produce or import, and all employers to provide information to their employees about the hazardous ahemicals to which they are exposed, by means of a hazard communication program, labels and other forms of warning, safety data sheets, and information and training. In addition, this section requires distributors to transmit the required information to amployers. (Employers who do not produce or import chemicals need only focus on those parts of this rule that deal with astablishing a workplace program and communicating information to their workers.)

(2) This section applies to any chemical which is known to be present in the workplace in such a manner that employees may be exposed under normal conditions of use or in a foreseable omergency.

(5) This section applies to labora-

 (i) Employers shall ensure that labels on incoming containers of hazardous shemicals are not removed or defaced;

(ii) Employers shall maintain any safeby data sheets that are received with incoming slitpments of hazardous chemicale, and ensure that they are readily accessible during each workshift to laboratory employees when they are in their work areas;

(iti) Employers shall ensure that laboratory employees are provided information and training in accordance with paragraph (a) of this section, except for the location and availability of the written hazard communication program under paragraph (h)(2)(iii) of this

section; and,

(iv) Laboratory employers that ship hazardous chemicals are considered to be either a chemical manufacturer or a distributor under this rule, and thus must ensure that any containers of hezardous chemicals leaving the laboratory are labeled in accordance with paragraph (f) of this section, and that a safety data sheet is provided to distributors and other amployers in accordance with paragraphs (g)(8) and (g)(7) of this section,

(4) In work operations where employces only handle chemicals in scaled containers which are not opened under normal conditions of use (such as are found in marine cargo handles, warehousing, or retail sales), this section applies to these operations only as

follows:

(i) Employers shall ensure that labels on incoming containers of hazardous chemicals are not removed or defaced; (ii) Employers shall insintain copies

(ii) Employers shall maintain copies of any safety data shoots that are received with incoming shipments of the scaled containers of hazardous chemicals, shall obtain a safety data sheet as soon as possible for scaled containers of hazardous chemicals received without a safety data sheet; and shall ensure that the safety data sheet; and shall ensure that the safety data sheets are readily accessible during each work shift to employees when they are in their work area(s); and,

(iii) Employers shall ensure that employees are provided with information and training in accordance with paragraph (h) of this section (except for the location and availability of the written hazard communication program under paragraph (h)(3)(iii) of this section), to the extent necessary to protect them in the event of a spill or leak of a hazardous chemical from a sected con-

tainer.

(5) This section does not require labeling of the following chemicals:

(i) Any posticide as such term is defined in the Federal Inspecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (? U.S.C. 186 st seq.), when subject to the labeling requirements of that Act and labeling regulations issued under that Act by the Environmental Protection Agency:

(ii) Any chemical substance or mixture as such terms are defined in the Toxic Substances Control Act (15 U.S.O. 2801 et seg.), when subject to the labeling requirements of that Act and labeling regulations issued under that Act by the Environmental Protection Agency.

(iii) Any food, food additive, color additive, drug, cosmetic, or medical or veterinary device or product, including materials intended for use as ingredients in such products (e.g. flavors and fragrances), as such terms are defined in the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act (21 U.S.C. 201 et seq.) or the Virus-Serum-Toxin Act of 1918 (21 U.S.C. 181 et seq.), and regulations issued under those Acts, when they are subject to the labeling requirements under those Acts by either the Food and Drug Administration or the Department of Agriculture;

(iv) Any distilled spirits (beverage alcohole), wine, or malt beverage intended for nonindustrial use, as such terms are defined in the Federal Alcohol Administration Act (27 U.S.C. 201 et seg.) and regulations issued under that Act, when subject to the labeling requirements of that Act and labeling regulations issued under that Act by the Burgan of Alcohol, Tobacco, Fire-

erms and Explosives:

(v) Any consumer product or hazardous substance as those terms are defined in the Consumer Product Safety Act (15 U.S.C. 2051 et seq.) and Federal Hazardous Substances Act (15 U.S.C. 1291 et seq.) respectively, when subject to a consumer product safety standard or labeling requirement of those Acts or regulations issued under those Acts by the Consumer Product Safety Commission; and,

(vi) Agricultural or vegetable seed breated with posticides and labeled in accordance with the Federal Seed Act (7 U.S.C. 1561 et see) and the labeling regulations issued under that Act by the Department of Agriculture,

(6) This section does not apply to: (1) Any hazardous waste as such term is defined by the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976, as amended (42 U.S.C. 890) at seq.), when subject to regulations issued under
